In 1997 we welcomed Kylee Thomas and her family to Shepparton Access. Kylee was the first person from the local community to access our service. Over a period of 20 years Kylee enjoyed many activities, however swimming, music and the toy library continued to be her favourites. Kylee and her family's life journey was reflected in our Behind Closed Doors publication.

We all miss Kylee and all have many warm memories.

John Hort was one of our nations unsung hero's. His contribution to many in our community cannot be measured. Over a period of 15 years, John travelled up and down the highway transporting a countless number of older people to the doctor and medical appointments in Melbourne. On most days, John would be on the road at 7am and not returning home until 5pm.

John, thank you for your massive contribution, may you rest in peace.

Patrick Crudden was the saviour of Shepparton Access and brought with him an abundance of knowledge and skills. At his first meeting he was elected chairperson of the board. Pat guided the organisation through both tragedy and celebration. Pat was instrumental in placing Shepparton Access in a position for forward thinking and human rights. He remained chairperson up until his retirement in 2001 and after continued to be an active member of the Shepparton Access Community.

### December 2016

#### International Day of People with Disability Celebration

He shared the full extent of his mental illness on his personal life, lost job opportunities, several arrests and growing dependence on alcohol. He was later diagnosed with Bipolar Disorder and ADHD. Heath indicated he now has his life back on track and supports others with mental heath issues.

Heath's presentation was very stirring and reminded us all of the possibility of vulnerability.

#### Andrew Mills Memorial Award

The presentation of the 2016 Andrew Mills was again a highlight of our end of year lunch at the Vault.

The award celebrates the life and achievements of our friend Andrew Mills and his contribution to Shepparton Access.

The award for outstanding performance was presented to Katrina. One of Katrina's many achievements in 2016 was being recognised by Australia Post - Our Neighbourhood Trust as a local legend.

The woodwork shed is also very popular. Each person is encouraged to learn new skills using a variety of tools to construct a variety of wooden products. All off-cuts of wood are utilised for our very popular bags of kindling.

We look forward to many new ideas in the pipeline for the coming year.







### June 2017

#### Eco Store

Eco Store continues to expand the variety of produce and products from EcoPark, from donations from local growers and vegetable suppliers and from many of our regular customers.

# September 2017

Due to the ever increasing demand for our services, the purchase of the building at 245 Wyndham Street provided us with an unique chance to expand our Eco brand and significantly increase the opportunities for people with disabilities to become enrolled in further education.

Our Eco Store has become a weekly shopping destination for many locals and our Education Centre with specialised technology will meet the emerging requests from many school leavers to enrol in further education into the future.

We welcomed Federal Member for Murray Damian Drum MP to open the building on the 29th August. Damian commented:

This type of service is critical for people with disability in enabling them to gain access to the service they need to become included into the community. The skills that the service users at Shepparton Access learn in the training rooms will be phenomenal. These are game changing kinds of skills.

Moving into our new Education Centre has resulted in substantial advancements to learning and further education. The use of innovative learning strategies such as Web and App applications, have provided a new learning environment and have resulted in many fantastic outcomes. Increasing learning potential and activities has become vital for growing each persons capacity to become valued members of the community.

### October 2017

#### Walk For Your Rights

The Rights Information and Advocacy Centre and Shout Out Self Advocacy Group hosted a Walk for Your Rights at Victoria Park Lake. Service Users joined in the walk to raise awareness about the rights of people with disabilities. The walk promoted the need for people with a disability to feel empowered to stand up for their rights, to have a voice and be heard.

The walk was a huge success. More than 60 people with disability, their carers and their friends walked around Victoria Park Lake. After the walk everyone participated in a variety of fun activities and shared a barbeque lunch.

National Carers Week ran from 15th - 21st October 2017. Carers Week reminds us of the need to recognise the two million Australians who provide care and support to a family member or friend with a disability.

People with disabilities rely on carers most days of the week.

The lunch provided an opportunity for us to thank our carers for their continuing support and dedication. Guest speaker Donna Rumbiolo from Shepparton's Women's Health Centre provided an informative incite into the need for carers to take time out for themselves and strategies to ensure carers maintain their own health and wellbeing both now and into the future.

### Looking to our future

As Shepparton Access looks to the future we cannot look beyond our transition into the NDIS. The NDIS is the most significant social welfare initiative of this generation. It signals a shift in the way people with permanent and significant disabilities access reasonable and necessary supports in order to achieve their goals and aspirations.

The future for people who attend Shepparton Access and their families evolves around our transition to the NDIS. As we move to the NDIS, it will become increasingly crucial to evaluate and monitor our processes and increase our service effectiveness. New ideas and opportunities will be need to be identified, however, our resources will remain finite.

The NDIS encourages community inclusion and provides people with choice and control over how, when and where they would like to spend their time.

Into the future, Shepparton Access will need to enter into more diverse markets and create a greater range of services to meet the changing needs of people with disabilities. Our future support services will increasingly focus on mainstream opportunities and our community inclusion model rather than the traditional disability support network.

Much has been said about the Shepparton Access community inclusion model over the years. It remains a concept which is very difficult to define. Rather, community inclusion has simply evolved over time and reflects the culture, the beliefs and the philosophy of our organisation.

People with disabilities will continue to be encouraged to take their place as full citizens in our community. Each person will receive the services they need to achieve their own goals in life. Services will be based on support needs rather than on their diagnosed disability.

The future for Shepparton Access will involve each member of our community working together to continue to be proactive in pushing the boundaries.
